Part 1: Observation	Part 2: Factual Research
<p>Instruction: Observe the provided photograph carefully and record everything visible in it. Focus on details such as buildings, people, clothing, and activities.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><input type="checkbox"/> Record observed details — note what is clearly visible in the photograph.<input type="checkbox"/> Identify unusual or interesting features — mark anything that stands out or seems different when compared with the present-day environment.	<p>Instruction: Use a smartphone (or other resources) to research factual information about the place shown in the photograph, considering the What? When? Who? Where? questions:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><input type="checkbox"/> What — Record factual information about the place.<input type="checkbox"/> When — Record the approximate date or period when the photograph was taken.<input type="checkbox"/> Who — Record information about people associated with the place.<input type="checkbox"/> Where — Record the location and nearby landmarks.

<p>Instruction: Analyse the collected information to understand the relationship between the photographed location and its social-historical context.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><input type="checkbox"/> What role or significance does the place hold?<input type="checkbox"/> How does the site reflect the influence of Western culture, or resistance to such influence?	<p>Instruction: Based on your photograph analysis and factual research, think about how the place has developed into its present form. Identify your own key themes or questions that you want to observe further during the actual site visit.</p>
